First Steps

toward arranging a mission trip

1. Pray! Seek God's desire for you, His direction, His timing. He is our leader. We always look to Him to tell us what to do, when to do it, and how to do it.

2. Assess Interest Ask around and find out if others are interested in a missions trip too. See if people in your church, work, school, or community are interested. The smallest size team we accept is five members. Fifteen to twenty-five is great! We take teams up to forty members.

3. Determine the desired project

Typically teams serve in one of three ways: Evangelical, Medical, or Construction.

Depending on the team structure, we may be able to accommodate two projects during your trip. Maybe your team is just wanting to help with whatever needs done! That's great!

4. Discuss a timeframe Planning a team is a lot easier if you have a general idea of when you would like to come. Discuss a few options in case there are no openings for your first choice.
